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OPTIONAL ORGANIZER—ARTISTIC RESPONSE

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Student Teacher School	What elements of the artwork seem to show up the most? How do those elements affect the overall effect of the piece? Do they create a sense of harmony, tension, or something else?	What parts of this artwork remind you of your own artwork? How are they similar or different? If you were to add something from this piece into your own artwork, what would it be and why?
Study a work of art. Use the prompts to describe what you see and compare your work with the art you chose. Attach a picture of the artwork, labeled with title and artist's name.	What do you notice first about this artwork? Why do you think that stood out to you? What is one question you would ask the artist about this work?	What feeling does this artwork show? Can you explain what in the artwork is creating that feeling? What story or message do you think the artist is trying to tell?

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REQUIRED LEARNING STANDARDS INVENTORY

The Portfolio Project is scored holistically across components. NYS Learning Standards for the Arts are the scoring criteria. This Inventory ensures inclusion of evidence for each Standard and Performance Indicator. It will direct the adjudicator to the components where each Performance Indicator is demonstrated.

Every component need not fulfill every Standard. Begin with the Personal Identity Component and work down the column, noting which standards are most clearly redemonstratedy checking them off and making notes. Move to the next column for the next component, checking off standards and making notes.

This optional resource may be used to prepare for presenting your portfolio at the adjudcation. Questions are examples of what adjudicators MIGHT ask you to discuss, based on the New York State Learning Standards for the Arts. Try to tell the story of your work but focusing on the Learning Standards.

VA:Cr1.1.6a	How have you used art materials in an inventive or unexpected way?	
VA:Cr2.1.6a	Can you show me an example of when you may have tried something you rarely or never tried before?	
VA:Cr2.1.6a	Can you tell me about the different art materials and techniques you used in your artwork?	
VA:Cr2.2.5.a	What are some ways you practice taking care of the tools and materials you are using?	
VA:Cr2.2.5b	Can you share a piece of your artwork that was inspired by another artist? How did you make sure to use their work in a respectful way while still making your art unique?
